

68-year-old Suzanne faces difficulty in accomplishing her basic activities of daily living - things many of us take for granted, as she suffers with Long-COVID in addition to other disabling medical conditions that include congestive heart failure, diabetes, and neuropathy. Your impact makes a world of difference for her.

Living in a modest 2-bedroom apartment with her daughter, who also serves as her caregiver, Suzanne finds herself alone most of the day since her daughter works full-time outside the home to support them. But thanks to you she receives daily visits from volunteers who deliver fresh, nutritious meals, welcome conversation and a safety check on her wellbeing. Thanks to you homemakers visit several times a week tidying up, doing laundry, running errands and making sure there are fresh, clean linens on the bed.

Suzanne's daughter is grateful for the great relationship her mom has with her volunteers and homemakers. It not only gives her peace of mind knowing Mom is being looked after while she's at work but also takes some of the weight off her by providing meals, taking care of household chores and keeping her company when she can't be there.

As evidenced in Suzanne's story, families also benefit from the peace of mind that comes with knowing their loved ones are receiving care at home. This is especially true for caregivers who might otherwise experience burnout from balancing caregiving responsibilities with their personal and professional lives.

One of the most profound impacts of the wide variety of services Seniors

First offers is the empowerment of individuals to live independently. For those with disabilities or chronic conditions,



these services provide the necessary support to manage their daily lives without relying heavily on institutional care. This sense of independence fosters self-esteem and contributes to overall well-being.


